

November 4, 1752: George Washington received the first degree of Entered Apprentice in the Lodge at Fredericksburg, Virginia.

November 15, 1775: The first Masonic calendar was published by order of Grand Master Robert Petre.

November 1, 1923: The cornerstone for the George Washington Masonic National Memorial was laid in Alexandria, Virginia.

#### Modern and annual observances

Veterans Day: November 11 is a day of remembrance for military veterans, a cause deeply connected to Masonic values of brotherhood, service, and patriotism. Many Masonic lodges have a history of supporting veterans and even created organizations like the Masonic Service Association to assist troops during wartime.

Thanksgiving: The values of gratitude and charity celebrated during Thanksgiving align with Masonic principles, and many lodges organize community dinners and charitable events during this time.

Masonic Service Association: Founded during World War I, the association is a significant Masonic effort to support American troops, with its origins tied to the month of November.

He convinced France to establish a lottery and got rich from it. Tried to sell lottery idea around Europe, but blew his fortune, got in debt, and went to prison(more than once).

That's what gambling and sex will do to you. He entered Freemasonry in Lyon, France, and became a Scottish Rite in Paris. Finally, after years of traveling Europe, bad luck in gambling, sexual encounters, his health deteriorated and died in what is now the Czech Republic.
